## TEXAS TEEN WINS NATIONAL CONTEST FOR BEST DISTRACTED DRIVING RADIO AD

AnnMarie Ingham, 17, wins \$1,000 scholarship

Westwood High School in Austin, TX, has been named engage young people in communicating important the winner of the JST DRV PSA Competition, sponsored by The National Road Safety Foundation (NRSF) and NSSP (National Student Safety Program), the youth arm of the American Driver & Traffic Safety Education Association. AnnMarie Ingham, 17, wrote and submitted a 30second radio public service announcement that will receive nationwide airplay on radio and the internet. The JST DRV PSA Competition invited teens to submit a Public Service Announcement that talks to teens about the risks of distracted driving.

Ingham's winning entry, titled **YOLO**, plays off the texting phrase for "You only live once." It spells out each letter of the phrase, followed by the sound of a car door closing. "Y -- You never know what one text can do. **O** – Overestimating how much you can multitask. L – Leaving family and friends behind, all because of O – Only one text. You only live once. Don't text and drive."
